I am aware of the ambiguity for the atomic weapon to be a dissuasion force, ensuring peace, and at the same time, a proliferating weapon being a major danger for humanity.

We have been through two world wars along the past century and we all discovered in 1945 the devastating effects of the atomic bomb. I have learned it at school. My elders taught me. I am lucky I have not known any conflict and I have had few privations.

But I am a young citizen of the world, worried about the gap between what leaders say and what they decide for their countries.

Today, we live in is an individualistic society which offers many opportunities and at the same time leaves you helpless. This world is excessively given media coverage and shows many types of loneliness.

We need to unify and to militate for our values. We have to give ourselves the means to live with serenity.

Threat, whatever shape it shall take, is not a solution. Discussion can make things move on. Conflict is a brake.

Our world relies on competition, and nuclear competition is no exception. It is urgent to redefine the notion of competition itself: it shall not be a competition aiming at being the best at all costs, but a competition showing the best in you.
